Jim Feast's introduction to the Unbearables Event in support of the Hundred Thousand Poets for Change – a reading/performance at A Gathering of the Tribes on September 24<sup>th</sup>, from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm.

During the more liberal and understaffed period of penology that occurred during WWII, when coed prisons were the norm, alleged saboteur Yoko Snapple and car thief Rollo Whitehead were detained in the same cell in Mule Creek state prison in California. It was there that they composed the famed and long-lost 1944 *Economic & Botanical Manuscripts*, which along with handy tips on rice cultivation, set out a simple, 878-step plan to achieve world peace and universal sister- and brotherhood.

This MS had been considered destroyed until last year researchers discovered a copy in deceased poet Allen Ginsberg's treasure box. The finding of this extraordinary MS has forced scholars to rethink the whole history of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, in fact, to question whether there actually ever was a 20th century.

In celebration of this enormous event, and in connection to the 100 thousand poets for change event, on September 24, 2011, the Unbearables will be reading from and about this MS as they usher in a new day.
